Element Hotel Holds Irving's First Ground "Awakening"

SAVA Holdings, explained the significance of the "ground awakening" stating, "Rather than breaking ground, we seek to enrich it just as we are enriching Irving."

The hotel design, construction and plans for management have all focused on eco-friendly materials and practices from lighting and low-flush toilets to recycling programs.

When complete, there will be 123 guest rooms—studios and 1- and 2-bedroom suites. Designed for longer-stay travelers, the hotel will have a fitness center and open spaces providing many areas for guests to meet, log on to the Internet, and enjoy a view of the gardens. Suites will include a gourmet pantry allowing guests to eat meals in a comfortable, private setting.

There is currently one other Element Hotel under construction in Lexington, Massachusetts so the race is on for the Irving hotel to be the first to open its doors. Completion is expected in a year.
